The air is composed of a mixture of gases; specifically, 78.09% N₂, 20.9% O₂, 0.93% Ar, 0.04% CO₂, plus a few more gases in the background.

However, the current condition in the heart of India, according to a WHO study of 1650 cities, it is the worst major metropolis in the world. The areas surrounding Delhi are also impacted. About 2.5 million individuals a year in India lose their lives due to air pollution. SAFAR reports that between 2016 and 2018, stubble burning was not in any rogue states, but that in 2019, it contributed more to pollution in Delhi than either Punjab or Haryana. In addition, the rate of stubble fires rose by 40% this year. From 0 to 50 is considered excellent, 51 to 100 is acceptable, 101 to 200 is bad, 201 to 400 is extremely poor, and 401 to 500 is considered dangerous, all based on the Air Quality Index. The air quality, according to the Indian Ministry of Environment, Forests, and Climate Change in Delhi during Diwali night was 1,000 or better and hence safe to breathe. It's very dangerous, and it was caused by people setting fire to their stubble. As a whole, Delhi and the surrounding states were impacted by the states of Punjab, Haryana, Ghaziabad, Gurgaon, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, and West Bengal. If the government is unable to act, then the media has no need to cover it, and people in other nations may not take climate change seriously if they hear nothing about it in the news. Some political leaders are paralyzed by this and unable to discuss or act on climate change. Water pollution, soil pollution, and noise pollution, like many other changes, can cause instability. A large portion of India's population relies on climate-vulnerable industries like farming, forestry, and fishing to make a living, thus the country has good reason to worry about global warming. Moreover, India is a broadly developing country. Most rural citizens depend on forest agriculture, farming, animal husbandry, or related climate.

There are currently 53 urban agglomerations in India with a population of 1 million or more, and 46 cities in India with a population of 10 million or more that are experiencing severe water, fresh air, and sanitation stress due to the rapidly deteriorating state of the environment. Many industries increase their territory and break the bio-diversity of climate for economic development. According to the Climate Change Performance Index, India got a "Good" rank of 11, while China had a medium rank of 33.

Furthermore, there is little political will to combat global warming. As a result, the media could only partially address the present problems. Media coverage of global warming has swayed public opinion on climate change by relaying the scientific consensus that emissions of greenhouse gases from human activities are the main cause of the recent increase in the global mean surface temperature record. Although a few organizations take non-committal attitudes, almost every credible scientific organization on the planet agrees with this assessment. Unusually high levels of media attention are being seen in carbon-dependent nations that have made obligations under the Kyoto Protocol (1992 United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change). There has been a significant amount of research conducted on how the media in English-speaking countries, notably in the United States, cover the topic of climate change.

Investigations into reporting in other countries, however, have been done for less money. Numerous studies have shown that after the 1995 and 2001 IPCC Assessment Reports, the media has mostly agreed on the subject of climate change, notably in the United States and the British tabloid press. A small percentage of scholars and journalists believe that the media adequately and impartially covers political problems. The bulk of research on this subject, however, is neither current nor environmental coverage-specific. Like a transitory phenomenon that fades away as the media moves on to new issues, media attention is not consistent. The media will only cover topics that are likely to attract the most attention. The University of Colorado Boulder found that in 2017, global warming and climate change garnered the highest media attention during June. The rise is "largely attributed to news surrounding United States (US) President Donald J. Trump's withdrawal from the 2015 United Nations (UN) Paris Climate Agreement, with media attention continuing to focus on the emerging US isolation following the G7 summit."

The media failed to report on the transformation of the international order. In the nineteenth century, British commercial forestry activities primarily in the western and southern regions of India devastated the country's forests, setting in motion one of the most effective for all reasons processes: deforestation. It continued unabated when the British authority fell. In 2009, India was ranked 10th globally in terms of forest loss, with an estimated 13.7 million hectares of forest being cleared per year. So Forest animals like elephants, mongooses, tigers, leopards, rhinos, lions etc were killed and annihilated. Around 2300 Elephants, 100,000 mongooses, 10 tigers, 460 leopards, and 11 big cats, etc., were killed yearly. Humans just kill them for financial reasons.
